After blocks:

- 1. College builds 80% remaning, registrar optimizes.
- 2. The registration process will be updated to accommodate students who are unsure of their major.

v1.0 & beyond: A Continuous Improvement Process

- During the Spring 2024 and Summer 2024 semesters
 - Continue to monitor the admissions, acceptance and orientation registration data and collaborate with colleges to adjust as needed and possible
 - Pilot registration process in Spring 2024 with special groups
- Fall 2024 Semester
 - Analyze data
 - Solicit colleges and other stakeholders for feedback
 - Continue to work with NISS, consultants and peers for best practices
 - Build v2.0 draft for Ftf in Fall 2025

Todd: Chancellor Purdue mentioned formula funding will be linked to graduation rates, so we are trying to improve graduation rates via this effort.

Sheb: Gtech and UGA graduation rates are OK. Only limited to FY intakes Thierry Leger: Impact of learning communities? Percentage of new students affected?

Lori Lowder: Block Scheduling is not learning communities; faculty have no additional input like learning communities.

Craig Basco: If our degree program maps have Area F courses in Term 1, will this offset that plan? Will program maps be changing?

Lori: We worked with colleges on this.

Lantz: Does anyone know if the admission requirements for KSU are going up? Or will ACT/SAT testing be required again?

Sheb: Test optional above 3.2

Bill: What will be the best way for faculty to provide input? Sheb: push it to associate Deans and department chair.


Bill: we generally reach out to CFC and DFC.

Thierry Leger: The faculty in the Department of World Languages and Cultures are concerned about block scheduling as they may have a negative impact on enrollment. Out of 13 languages taught in the Department, only one, Spanish, is currently included in Fall 2024 block scheduling.

Lori: Only for first-time freshmen, first semester; if concerns still remain, please communicate through your college.

Yvonne Wichman: It seems short-sighted on our part not to look more closely at the huge success rate of learning communities at KSU and compare that success to this new initiative.

Campaign for KSU 200 Million, USD: Scholarship, fellowships, endowed professorships, student affairs, athletics, new baseball stadium. Budget education sessions: Budget 101 and 201 sessions.

Relationship between USG and KSU: 19 members of BoR, USG is the operational arm. Chancellor, VC academic affairs, VC facilities. Board policies (some flexibilities) Board

of trustees (KSU foundation). Interact with the legislature in January. Athletics transition in July 2024.

Todd: Chancellor mentioned @ USG council: 1. Funding from legislature2. Funding cut to support low-performing colleges.

Kat: Hopeful that we will have the cut reinstated.

Austin Brown: Related to the transition to Conference USA, in the Spring semester, the Provost's Athletic Oversight Council will begin to reevaluate academic policies (e.g., number of excused absences) for student-athletes. We will keep the full senate updated if/when changes are made and what they specifically are
