New Business

- 1. New process to roll grades for summer 2024 Paul Parker (5 minutes) Beginning next May, grades will be rolled out to history by the end of the May semester. Faculty missing this deadline will need to submit a grade change.
 - 2. Policy on having minors on campus Ann Schroeder (5 minutes)

Ann Schroeder: Minor policy from 2017. Minor registry, series of approvals. Background screens, parental waiver, safety and security, and retention requirements. Also involves internships and other mentoring activities. Website: protectingMinors.kennesaw.edu

3. Representative needed for policy council (5 minutes)

Susan Smith: Faculty senate liaison to policy council? (Virtual Meeting), no volunteers yet.

Bill Griffith: Moving from the calendar year to the academic year, the Committee to look into this. First meeting tomorrow and hopefully come up with a recommendation, after reviewing what others are doing as well. Negotiating workload when we start the academic year.

This will be considered holistically, including PTR, etc.

4. First reading of changes to Faculty Senate Bylaws to include the Part-Time Faculty Council President as a full voting member of the Faculty Senate (5 minutes) (Todd Harper and Yvonne): Instead of the three-year term, a part-time faculty president will serve 2 years. Would like to have a full term. 42 representatives out of the 47 departments. One vote for the part-time faculty for representation. Susan Smith: This can open gates for others as well. Part-time faculty may often be connected with each other than with the people within the department. Todd Harper: If we have the part-time faculty council as a voting member, do we need a liaison: It might be duplicative.

Micheal Van Dyke: Add principle lecturer

a. Senators will serve a three-year term except for the President of the Part-time Faculty Council who will serve a two-year term. During each spring semester, or as needed if vacancies arise, each instructional department elects one Senator who is a member of the corps of instruction—i.e., lecturer, senior lecturer, instructor, assistant professor, associate professor, professor or duly certified librarian—who does not have ex officio faculty status as a result of an appointment to an administrative office (see BOR Policy Manual, §3.2.1.3). No one who has accepted an administrative appointment that requires 50% or more administrative duties may serve as a department's Senator.

Bill Grifith: Delete the job list, if we are including all from the core of instructors. Yvonne: The President of PTFC gets half of a course fee, maybe a conflict with ACA, if elected faculty is added. Part-time faculty are severely limited in the number of hours. Susan Smith: Talk to your departments, and please send feedback.

5. Senate Motion on Faculty Pay – Amy Donahue, Steven Collins, Heather Pincock (30 minutes)

Heather Pincock: The recent salary adjustment was only for full-time, not part-time, so this motion also addresses part-time. Part-time faculty had an adjustment in 2019. Full-time have received 2 cost adjustments since.

Steve Collins: We appreciate the efforts of the President and Provost to raise faculty pay to equitable levels. This motion indicates to make this a regular. Also, the faculty are limited to 75%, that makes us underpaid by 10's of thousands of dollars. We are requesting a 3-year timeline to address this gap.

Amy Donahue: The salary studies have been one-off; no clear ongoing plan has been planned. The task force did recommend this in 2019, and we are proposing something like the task force recommendation be put in place.

Yvonne: Last pay increase in 2021. That pay increase did not benefit all.

Heather Pincock: Colleagues, please note that Full Time Faculty are paid 10% of our salary per course when teaching in the summer. A wage floor of \$3000 per course for Part-Time Faculty is well below 10% of even the lowest-paid full-time faculty at KSU. Vote: 40 yes., 0 no.

- 7. Under President Swag's leadership, we have added an unprecedented 6M\$, together with 29M\$ as regular salary. Buck study includes a comparator group, in which we racked at the very bottom in terms of the institutional metrics. The administration remains committed. We want to retain the faculty. Any increase will include rewarding performance. 406K\$ have been used for part-time. The reality of most academic institutions, not all people can get salary benefits at the same time. Thanks to Dr. Griffith and the group for his service. Will support part-time faculty's presence in FS.

Todd Harper: Some years may be equity adjustment, merit adjustment handled differently by the state than equity.

Provost Ivan Pulinkala: USG approval for merit raise. The process is very different than equity. Resources permitting well will look into improving adjustments.

Amy Donahue: Provost Pulinkala -- is it your contention that the BUCK group's selection of peer institutions was flawed, or are you saying that, because some R1 institutions were included within the peer group, the fair rate for KSU faculty should be lower than peer average? Provost Ivan Pulinkala: When we got to USG we cannot be resourced the way R1 institutions are.

Steve Collins: Faculty have KSU have to work more in summer, which cuts into research productivity.

Albert Jimenez: If the 19 R1s are removed, do we know if we are compensated below other R2s?

Provost Ivan Pulinkala: Our compensation structure is set up for Comprehensive Institutions, not R1—our institutional performance metrics (metrics will be posted).

In asking for more compensation, we are also evaluated on the institution's metrics. In any compensation model, we should reward the best performers. We cannot have our hands tied on how we do this.

We do not know what resources we have at some of the external sources of money has external guidance on how to spend.

We will continue this focus, but the context is beyond the scope. Keep in mind when we ask for more funding, we have accountability for graduation rate and other institutional metrics. We want to advance the salary, but we have to do everything in rotation and ensure we also improve the institutional metrics.
